

Trump Team Targets NEA, NEH & CPB

Mike Mulvaney, President Trump's director of the Office of Management & Budget, has made it clear that three cultural institutions --- the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting

(CPB) --- are
"something [the federal government] cannot defend anymore."

For at least thirty years these three entities have been the target of conservatives' ire, often more for the projects they support (which they tend to see as too liberal) rather than cost (which is relatively modest).

But, for the first time in history, an administration is proposing shutting them down. (The Institute of Museum & Library

Services has also been target for closure).

The arts community has chosen to fight back aggressively. *Variety's* Ted Johnson explains that **Americans for the Arts** (AFA) has also done something for the first time: they've hired an outside counsel, **Brownstein Hyatt Farber** Schreck.

The AFA was founded in 1996 through the merger of two non-profit organizations to support arts on the local level. The Denver-based Brownstein Hyatt Farber Schreck was founded as a law firm in 1968 that expanded into lobbying in 1995 and has a large office in Washington, D.C.

Johnson reports that the AFA's Nina Ozlu Tunceli has been meeting with Republican leaders in both the House and Senate. Tunceli found that "there is really no appetite to eliminate these cultural agencies" which are seen, at least in part, as beneficial to local economies and communities.

"Federal dollars are used to leverage state, local and private funding," write Philip Kennicott and Peggy McGlone in the *Washington Post* "that supports a complex network of arts organizations, educational entities, museums, libraries and public broadcasting affiliates."

Locally-based efforts are being spearheaded by the **Greater Pittsburgh Arts Council**.

Pelley To Leave "Evening News" Anchor Chair

At press time, *Variety* reported that Scott Pelley is stepping down as anchor of the "CBS Evening News."



"Evening News" is the flagship program of the CBS television network. CBS Corporation owns broadcast stations in Pittsburgh, most notably KDKA.

Variety's Brian Steinberg posted the story online early on the morning of May 31. The winner of multiple awards, Pelley apparently wants to focus on his "60 Minutes" reporting full time. He has anchored "Evening News" since succeeding Katie Curic in 2011.

Later in the day, in a separate posting, Steinberg reported that Anthony Mason would at least temporally assume the anchor chair.

Midtown Towers Catches Fire; 100 Displaced

The following is a personal report written by Pittsburgh Applause publisher James A. Richards.

Early in the morning of Monday, May 15, a seven-alarm fire began in Apartment 606 of Midtown Towers, one of the iconic structures in the Pittsburgh Cultural District. That apartment's resident, 75-year-old Mary Robinson, perished. Much of the sixth, seventh and eighth floors were essentially swept away by the flames.

Midtown Towers was constructed in 1907 by newspaper owner Colonel Thomas J. Keenan (?-?) at the then-astounding cost of \$2 million. It was initially called the T. J. Keenan Building and was, for years, the tallest building in Pittsburgh. The facade is decorated with face carvings that range from George Washington (1732-1799) to Pittsburgh Mayor George Guthrie (1848-1917).

The T. J. Keenan Building was the headquarters for the *Penny* Press (a forerunner to the Pittsburgh Press) and the unique domed top floor was a luxury penthouse where Thomas Keenan lived. In the early 1970s it was repurposed as affordable housing (some of it subsidized) with retail on the first floor. The resulting apartments are small, but tasteful and comfortable and provide a convenient place to live for an eclectic collection of students (many of them artists), single professionals, retirees and the disabled.

For me, a professional with issues like spinal stenosis, Midtown has been an ideal location to continue my projects --- projects that each of you benefits from --- while managing my health and life.

Midtown routinely passed its safety inspections, as Megan Guza confirmed in *the Pittsburgh Tribune-Review*. That help around 100 people to escape with little or no injury. (You can read her article at http://triblive.com/local/allegheny/12300584-74/fire-at-pittsburgh-apartment-building).

The "bones" of the building (foundation, walls, roof, etc.) are strong but some of the infrastructure (such as wiring) has been compromised. We have been told to expect at least six months before the tenants can return to their homes.

I am among the most fortunate: all of my personal and professional belongings survived the fire. As of this writing, around have of the residences are residing at a hotel in Monroeville (the rest are staying with friends or family). Midtown Towers' management hopes to arrange better temporary housing sometime in June. However, since most of us are urbanites who don't drive, we are pretty much isolated here.

Pittsburgh Artist Gets Premier Residency

Pittsburgh native Nate Lewis has been chosen to spend a four-week residence on Martha's Vineyard to create work for this year's Art on the Vine exhibition.

Art on the Vine (AOV) is a non-profit subsidiary of **The Agora Culture**, a national online multicultural arts platform that connects new and seasoned art collectors with contemporary visual artists. AOV seeks to educate and showcase a diverse array of artists through a four-week residency program and annual art exhibition in Martha's Vineyard.

Nate Lewis is a former critical care nurse now living in Washing-

ton, DC. He specializes in intricate 2-dimensional and 3dimensional sculptures made from sheets of paper. Each work combines elements of etching, textiles and embroidery.

"This residency will give me more freedom to try new techniques that typically take longer to achieve," Nate explains in a press release. "I'm really looking forward to spending time on the Vineyard, getting to know the community, and working on my practice."

Martha's Vineyard is an island off the Massachusetts coast that is considered a prime summer vacation spot for about 100,000 people each year. Its believed to have been named by English explorer Bartholomew Gosnold (1571-1607) after his daughter. The Art on the Vine's annual festival is scheduled for August 13 through 15.

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Warhol Changes

Important personnel changes have been made at the Andy Warhol Museum, one of the four Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh.



A press release dated May 10 explains that the changes "strengthen The Warhol's ability to accomplish its mission and achieve its goals."

The changes are promotions: financial chief Rachel Baron-Horn is now deputy director; Jose Carlos Diaz has been upped to chief curator; associate curator Jessica Beck is now the Milton Fine Curator of Art; and education curator Danielle Linzer has been named director of learning and public engagement.

Cosby Jury Selected

A jury of Pittsburghers has been selected for comedy legend Bill Cosby's Philadelphia trial.

For decades Cosby has been a beloved comedian and actor. From his early days on the standup circuit to hit TV shows that include "I Spy" (1965-1968) and "The Cosby Show" (1984-1992) as well as the best-selling book, *Fatherhood* (1986), Billy Cosby has been referred to as "America's Dad".

But dogging him during his long career have been rumors of drugassisted sexual abuse of women. This began to change in 2014 when the first of a series of public accusations began. On December

30, 2016, was charged in Philadelphia with sexual assault. It was decided that the jury would be drawn from the Pittsburgh-area because of the intense media coverage in Philadelphia.

Two African-Americans are among the 12 that will be seated for the trial, as are two of the six alternates. While this sounds like too few, the Associate Press reports that the "jury's racial makeup of 17% black is higher than the 13% black population" of Allegheny County.

The trial is set to begin June 5. The 79-year-old Cosby is not expected to testify.

Abby Miller Sentenced

Abby Lee Miller --- the former star of the Pittsburgh-based reality show "Dance Moms" has been sentenced to a year in jail after being convicted of money laundering and bankruptcy fraud.

She has also been fined \$40,000 and been assessed a judgment of

\$120,000. Once released from jail, Miller will be on probation for two years.

Miller formally resigned from the show in March, which is now produced in California.

Local Priest's Papal Pictures

Pittsburgh-based priest, Father James P. Colligan, has just published a visual document of a historic visit by the late Pope John Paul II.

Colligan has been a Catholic priest for some six decades and spent much of his career in Japan. He is also a professional writer and journalist with a love of the photographic arts. In 1981, Pope

Saint John Paul II (1920-2005) made a historic visit to Tokyo and two other cities --- Hiroshima and Nagasaki, which were hit by the first atomic bombs toward the end of World War II (1939-1945).

The Visit of Pope John Paul II to Japan in Photographs 1981 provides an detailed visual record of this pilgrimage. "I have always admired Pope John Paul II and

was honored to be able to follow him through Japan and listen to his plea for peace," Father Colligan says in a press release. "With all the hate attacks around the country and the world, I believe the Pope's plea for peace speaks louder than ever."

Biting The Middle Man With Bitcoin

Musicians and singers seeking ways to connect directly with (and especially make money from) their audiences may have a new tool, writes Terry Brock in the *Pittsburgh Business Times*: Bitcoin.

Bitcoin is a virtual currency system introduced in 2009 by a group of anonymous computer programmers using the pseudonym Satoshi Nakamoto. However, the value of Bitcoin is highly dependent on what users decide since the currency is not backed by any government's central bank. Nevertheless, major companies like Microsoft and Overstock.com have embraced it as well as some nonprofits such as Greenpeace.

Digital currencies are being used by an increasing number of artists, reports Brock, "to process financial transactions faster and at much lower transaction fees" --and, if necessary, without a label, distributor or agent.

Filmmaker's Penthouse Sale

The former owner of Legendary Entertainment, billionaire Thomas Tull, is putting his Pittsburgh penthouse up for sale. The news was first reported by Mark David in *Variety*.

Located inside the modernist Three PNC Plaza (completed in 2009 and home to a Fairmont Hotel), Tull created the 13,000square-foot home by buying condos in multiple transactions between 2012 and 2013. The result is what David describes as "a sumptuous and audaciously opulent neoclassical fantasia with seven bedrooms and nine full and two half bathrooms."

Tull is also a minority owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and will continue to reside in the Pittsburgh-area.




